Dear Friends:

As is fitting for the SURPASSING importance of Easter, the season of anticipation/preparation (Lent) is a lengthy six weeks combined with the explication of the whole Passion Narrative throughout Holy Week culminating in the fire, smoke, oil, water, bread and wine of Saturday's Paschal Vigil, followed with the kaboom of Easter morning colors and festivity. And then....while Costco shifts to Summer gardening supplies and Mother's Day gifts, we 'people of faith' spend an additional FIFTY more days considering exactly what a Resurrection is and why it is of utmost value. Called to have feet in both the secular and religious worlds, it can be hard to hold on to the concerns of FAITH when the earthly world is anticipating graduations, summer vacations, family reunions and Memorial Day/Fourth of July barbecues. Thus....today is just the BEGINNING of Easter, the weeks to come will unfold the story in the same way we unwrapped our **Story of Faith** throughout Lent and Holy Week. The 50 days leading to Pentecost is our time to stare at the empty tomb, to hear the stories of people's encounters with the Risen Jesus, to scratch our heads a bit and to think long and hard while letting the words of the Easter Story, along with the STORIES of the early Church shared in the Acts of the Apostles, be seen in the fresh light of 2018. Hopefully you have enough Peeps and See's chocolates on which to nibble during these upcoming days and nights!

As the mountain snows melt and Spring rains diminish, the same women who have brought us the joy of the yearly 'Women's Tea' are getting ready to offer a 'change of pace' with something new for 2018. Still to include delicious food and even more tasty table conversations, the focus will be.....well, I can't really tell you yet because it is a surprise the women of our Large Group Hospitality Ministry want to share themselves. The date is going to be Mother's Day Weekend, Saturday, May 12th....so be alert for when the tickets go on sale....they get snapped up quickly and space is limited (because of what is going to be presented....but I can say no more!!)

Given this year's lengthier build up, a very clear GOAL of a PERMANENT CHURCH and YOUTH MINISTRY FACILITY, plus a whole weekend of Q&A about starting the process to build-out our Parish, I will admit to a mild disappointment back in early February when the FIRST batch of Pastoral Services Appeal (PSA) pledges were tabulated and the amount came in just barely above what we had done in 2017. Continually reminding myself that the RAISING of LARGE SUMS of MONEY is a MARATHON and not a sprint I have taken GREAT comfort in the gradual RISE each week as more and more of our parishioners make a commitment. As of March 23 (when this Bulletin Letter had to be written) we have reached a Pledge Total of \$430,102, with 437 of our 1100 Registered Families making a pledge. I really want to be able to celebrate the FIRST MASS within our Permanent Church while still Pastor (I don't want to be invited back after somebody else completes the dream!) and I am heartened by this steady weekly GROWTH in pledge commitments. For those of you waiting on the periphery to see if others believe in the dream....I urge you to set aside your hesitation and join the growing number of people who are helping our future to become REAL. \$430,000 (so far) from less than HALF of our Registered parishioners!!! Imagine what we can do if EVERYONE made a pledge? Let's GO Santa Clara, let's show those who said we couldn't do this....that we CAN and WILL!

While PROMINENTLY Easter Sunday, today is also April Fool's Day, an event that can variously be traced back to 1700 or into the 1500's. Essentially a Springtime ritual giving permission to be 'silly', the concept is suspected by some to be linked to the change from the Julian Calendar to the Gregorian calendar....which changed the start of each New Year to January 1st. Some have also suggested that it may have something to do with the change from Winter to Spring and the fickleness of seasonal weather patterns. In any case, in the weeks of March, I was involved with 'Contract Negotiations' for the upcoming Diocese of Orange Priest Retreats.....wait for it....in the years 2023 and 2024. This involved some visitations to The Westin in Palm Desert and plenty of email and phone conversations. What was ever before me was the date, 2024.....which is the year in which I presumably will retire from active ministry when I turn 70. Not only did it seem like fate was rubbing my face in my advancing age, along with my rapidly depleting years left to actively serve within a parish...there was also this very real reality that I may still be making meatballs, bacon-wrapped dates and assorted other Retreat treats right up until the end. 2024...why, it is just around the corner....so close that I might miss all that's yet to occur in 2019, 2020, 2021, 2022 and 2023. Who needs April Fool's when life itself has a way to make us feel odd?

Hoping you see the humor in all of that, have a wonderful Easter weekend, be kind to those you encounter and always remember, you are loved!!! FKB

MARCH 29, 2018

EVENING MASS OF THE LORD'S SUPPER - HOLY THURSDAY

EXODUS 17:1-14

FIRST CORINTHIANS 11:23-26

JOHN 23:1-15

During the Second World War, the Korean War and the Vietnam War (ancient history to so many but still strong memories for the vets among us) those whose loved ones were departing by ship would trek to the upper floor of the Mark Hopkins Hotel atop Nob Hill in San Francisco to both wave goodbye and keep the departing ships in sight as long as possible. Those whose children are departing for college will linger at an airport to watch as the plane ascends into the clouds and for those whose children are driving away, they may walk out into the street to keep the diminishing vehicle in sight as long as possible. Good byes are difficult, painful and filled with many questions. They mark the ending of things we thought we knew, they symbolize the onset of confusion as new voids wait to be filled. This evening we overlay all of our good-byes with that of Jesus ritually saying goodbye to his disciples and companions. What is of SURPRISING value is the Gospel emphasis given to Jesus kneeling and washing the feet of his disciples....while the institution of Eucharist is given a scant 12 lines from Paul's First Letter to the Corinthians. Thousands of years later, we have made a fine art of 'doctrinizing' Jesus' human-divinity to the point that his tenderness, mercy and HEART have been erased from our proclamation of who he was...and who he still IS. We skip quickly past Jesus WEeping at the tomb of Lazarus.... we rush past Jesus kneeling before his disciples to wash their feet, we hesitate to ponder what Jesus felt when the cock crowed twice and he knew Peter had denied knowing him, we don't consider what Judas' kiss did to Jesus, we don't pause to consider what Jesus felt seeing his mother in so much pain as he dies above her. As our entry point into Triduum, tonight is about the tenderness of Jesus, of his farewells and embrace of what was to come. What have been your goodbyes that still linger in your heart? Where are the voids that have yet to be filled? How did you say goodbye to those who have made you who you are....and whom do you regret not having had the opportunity to say goodbye? There is nowhere where the grace of God is not and nothing exists outside of God's grace...even our goodbyes.

'During the supper, fully aware that the Father had put everything into his power and that he had come from God and was returning to God, Jesus rose from supper and took off his outer garments. He took a towel and tied it around his waist. Then he poured water into a basin and began to wash the disciple's feet and dry them with the towel around his waist.'

Thank you for joining with our Santa Clara Community as we enter into TRIDUUM, our STORY of faith that takes three days to tell and appreciate. The baskets surrounding the altar are filled with 'blessed' bread (not consecrated) and is available for you to take home at the end of tonight's experience so that you may 'break bread' on Easter Sunday at your celebratory brunch, lunch or dinner...uniting what we have done tonight with what you will celebrate on Sunday. Our Good Friday portion of Triduum continues tomorrow at 7pm, likewise with the conclusion of Triduum on Saturday, also at 7pm. The Blessed Sacrament will be available on the Altar of Repose until midnight for your private prayer. Drive safely...and remember, no matter how many good-byes you have lived, you are loved. FKB

TRIDUUM CONTINUES - GOOD FRIDAY OF THE LORD'S PASSION

ISAIAH 52:13 - 53:12

HEBREWS 4:14-16; 5:7-9

JOHN 18:1-19:42

Living as we do within the world of recordable history we are able to assemble real-time accurate recreations and understandings of how things have transpired. By salvaging the 'black boxes' from plane crashes we can better understand what went wrong; by collecting assorted private videos taken from different perspectives we can gain fuller observance and understanding of a crime, a natural disaster, an event, without editorial comment or unintentional second guessing. Not having the benefit of cameras or black boxes during the time of Jesus, each year we, at great length, recall the story of his crucifixion, death and burial. Having been reminded of his personal connections with his disciples from last night's Holy Thursday washing of feet and institution of Eucharist, tonight we wrestle with Jesus' personal choice to allow himself to be humiliated, demeaned, tortured and killed...all in full view of his friends and mother. He who raised others from the dead, could surely have prevented his own demise. He who once walked through unruly crowds would not have feared an angry Jewish mob. When challenged by Pilate (in the Gospel of Matthew), Jesus himself admitted that his Father would have sent him more than 12 legions of angels if he had requested their assistance. So, having all the power in the universe, Jesus ALLOWS himself to die a most humiliating death at the very hands of those he loves. Like a parent who endures the wrathful rants of a child or distraught teen - 'I HATE YOU -; through the death of Jesus, God has demonstrated his divine patience with our rants, sins and efforts to force God to abandon us. Knowing what we now know regarding the Resurrection (still to come on Sunday) we are able to appreciate the Crucifixion of Jesus in the light of God allowing us to give it our best shot to drive him from us....and yet he continues to love us and dwell among us. TODAY is the crucial day of our salvation....today is the remembered story by which God gives us complete freedom to run amok...but won't stop loving us. What have been the challenges to love those who have hurt you? What crosses have you carried and died upon due to your relationships? How easy would it have been to abandon those who scorned your friendship and love? How have you been enriched or debilitated by your choice to embrace the Cross of loving people?

Thank you for sharing Day Two of Triduum with our Santa Clara Community. Tomorrow, Saturday, is a day of waiting, a day of coming to terms with what we, humanity, did today. The Vigil conclusion to Triduum begins at 7pm tomorrow night, followed by a festive celebration in honor of our Candidates and Catechumens about to be fully welcomed into our faith. You are reminded again that there are no Confessions, nor 5pm Mass, tomorrow. If you will not be joining us at the Vigil, our Easter Sunday Masses are the usual 8am, 10am and 12noon....but with much greater crowds, please arrive early....and remember, you are loved. FKB

CONCLUSION OF TRIDUUM – VIGIL IN THE HOLY NIGHT OF EASTER
GENESIS 1:1, 26-31; GENESIS 22:1-18; EXODUS 14:14-15:1;
ROMANS 6:3-11; MARK 16:1-7

Was it morning or night when you were born? What was the name of your first neighborhood friend? Why were they your friend? Besides your mother, with whom did you share a first kiss? What was your first trip away from home without family? What was your first frightening life experience? Who was your first serious boyfriend or girlfriend with whom you broke up? What were your favorite subjects and favorite teachers in school? Why? Details, details details...our lives are full of them and within the details exists our **UNIQUENESS**. Depending on the depth of relationship we seek to build with assorted people, we convey our uniqueness to them within the stories we share. Throughout this past week we have slowly unfolded **OUR** story of faith, a story that has its origins within the primitive, yet sacred, creation myths of our ancient human and Jewish ancestors. Our story is of God slowly but methodically revealing himself to our ancestors and finally becoming one with us, within the Incarnation of Jesus. Our story-telling has taken on greater depth in these past days of **TRIDUUM** as we have remembered the life and death of Jesus....death at our hands and a death that Jesus allowed to occur so as to affirm the depth of his love for all humanity. This **VIGIL** night, like our ancestors of old, we gather within the comforting light of the sacred outdoor paschal fire and our lit candles inside. In sharing our stories and rituals we welcome those who have sought to become united with us as members of our Roman Catholic-Christian community. In embracing them, with their own unique histories and experiences, our 'spiritual gene pool' is freshly enriched and their lives are likewise enlivened by what we have learned from our successes and failures, our joys and our times of grief, all summed up within our rituals, rites, prayers and community rhythms. Each Easter, **ALL OF US** are invited to renew **OUR** story, to hear it again, to speak it to our children, to celebrate it with smoke, fire, water, oil, bread and wine, eggs and chocolate, fasting and feasting, weeping and smiling. Winter is past and Spring is erupting from the soil beneath our feet. In like manner, on this Vigil night, we are invited to open those spots within our lives that are maimed by anger, fear, disappointment, shame, embarrassment, loss and hurt. We open these tombs so that the grace of **RESURRECTION** can begin to restore us to life, the life that God has imagined for us from the moment he willed us into existence. Our story tonight is different from the one we would have told last year and next year's will be different than the one we share tonight. But tonight...this is the night when God again looks at us and repeats what he said in the dawning moments of our humanity...

'Then God said: Let us make human beings in our image, after our likeness. Let them have dominion over the fish of the sea, the birds of the air; the tame animals, all the wild animals, and all the creatures that crawl on the earth. God created mankind in his image; in the image of God he created them; male and female he created them. God blessed them and God said to them: Be fertile and multiply; fill the earth and subdue it. Have dominion over the fish of the sea, the birds of the air, and all the living things that crawl on the earth. God also said: See, I give you every seed-bearing plant on all the earth and every tree that has seed-bearing fruit on it to be your food and to all the wild animals, all the birds of the air, and all the living creatures that crawl on the earth, I give all the green plants for food. And so it happened. God looked at everything he had made, and found it very good.'

Tonight has been filled with our sacred rituals, tomorrow we are not as constrained and the Masses are tinged with brightness in the same manner as the rising sun dispels the dark of night; if you have the energy, you might wish to return tomorrow to experience Easter Morning. THE RESURRECTION OF THE LORD
EASTER SUNDAY

ACTS 10:34-43

FIRST CORINTHIANS 5:6-8

JOHN 20:1-9

While the particulars will vary, most of us have personal stories of great loss, defeat, embarrassment, fear and pain. In like manner many of us have personal experiences of great happiness, success, courage and fulfillment. While both the highs and lows of life have shaped and formed us, many are hesitant to share the details of either with just anyone. Precisely because these experiences/events have intimately contributed to making us whom we are, they are held tightly within our memories and only shared among those with whom we are building strong relationships.

Which brings us to the Scriptural stories we have been unfolding for this past week, especially the passages from this morning's Acts of the Apostles and the Gospel of John. To many they might sound hysterical, illusionary, fabricated, disingenuous or outright lies. But the details are too vivid: the women going to the tomb and **RUNNING** to tell Peter and John what they **DID NOT** find; Peter and John **LIKEWISE** running....not questioning the women...but **RUNNING** to see for themselves. The details of the burial cloths set in different spots...the tongue in cheek manner of indicating that one disciple was a **FASTER** runner than the other...these are the ways in which vivid stories are retold...in the same manner our generation can still retell where we were and what we did on 9-11. This story of the empty tomb, still to be fully understood in the days to come when the disciples would encounter the **RISEN** Jesus, this a story that mingles their Good Friday's pain, fear, loss and defeat with the unexplainable happiness, possibilities and potential joy of 'The First Day of the Week'-Easter Sunday. This is the story that would define these disciples for the rest of their lives and for which they would sacrifice their lives. This was their story and they embraced it with the 'sacred conviction' that it was their responsibility to **SHARE** what they had experienced with as many people as they could.

Throughout all the hours, weeks and months since **WE** last shared our Sacred Stories in their fullness, we have lived our lives. Graduations have been celebrated, job changes accepted, births joyfully honored, anniversaries marked and time-tested relationships deepened. Side by side we have struggled to understand mass shootings, political disarray on all sides, betrayals of vows, broken promises, unbidden aches/pains/surgeries, deaths of loved ones and the inevitable effects of time's passage.

The voice of darkness, the same voice that challenged Jesus to turn stones to bread, encourages us to doubt, to dismiss and reject the stories of resurrection and life. The voices of darkness allure us to believe we are better off alone, that we should look upon each other with suspicion and judgment. The voices of darkness tempt us to seek vengeance rather than mercy, to see kindness as weakness and to believe lies to be the truth. Thus has the voice of darkness done for as long as humanity has existed...which is precisely why the **INCARNATION**, of God becoming human, occurred....so that one of us...a God-Human, in the person of Jesus, could be the lens by which we can clearly see and embrace what the **LIGHT** reveals to be freeing and good while equally seeing that the lies, isolation and vengeance, promoted by darkness, lead to captivity, deprivation and enduring pain.

On this Easter morning, the Sacred Stories believed and embraced by the first disciples of Jesus, have once again been shared and **THE LIGHT** of Christ is shown to still be bright and available to all. These are good days to remember the many times the **GRACE** of God has enabled you to walk out of darkness, strengthened you to carry whatever Cross was heavy on your heart and helped you to see God at work within your months and years. These are good days for you to add your **OWN** testimony to that of Peter and John and the women at the tomb...Jesus is alive, Jesus is real, you have encountered him, time and time again. Darkness wants you to forget what you know but our **SACRED STORIES** help you to see and embrace the truth.

Darkness tried hard to kill Jesus and end his story...but he is **ALIVE** and **WELL**, shining bright, with pierced hands and heart open to **YOU**.

*Remember your own SACRED STORY...join it with the sacred stories of billions of people throughout the centuries;
 Easter is not a date but the LIGHT that shines when you live what you know to be true. Jesus IS RISEN...
 Shine BRIGHT and BE EASTER!*

Thank you for journeying from far and wide to share our Santa Clara de Asis celebrations of Easter. For those of you new to our community, a special welcome...I hope those surrounding you have been gracious and kind. Our entire Season of Lent, combined with the fullness of Holy Week and now Easter Weekend is made possible through the sacrifice and dedication of those who want our liturgical celebrations to be as excellent as possible. **My THANKS** to our Music Ministry, Hospitality Teams, Sacristans, Lectors, Eucharistic Ministers, Knights of Columbus, Greeters, Art and Environment Participants, Mary Chavez, Philip Parke, Pam Melancon, Billy Wojciack, Emily Bent, Marc Jordan, Kirsten King, Pat deFries, Seminarian Michael, Maria McFarland and **EACH OF YOU** who bring Santa Clara to **LIFE**. HEART TO HEART


Have you ever thought about that sanctuary space within you where God dwells and how hard it is from time to time to find it?
